EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY AND AFFIRMATIVE ACTION STATEMENT AND PLAN

EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY AND AFFIRMATIVE ACTION STATEMENT AND PLAN

The Connecticut Resources Recovery Authority (CRRA) is an equal opportunity and affirmative action employer, dedicated to a policy of nondiscrimination in employment on any basis prohibited by law. It is the CRRA's policy to provide equal employment and advancement opportunities to all individuals without regard to age, sex, race, color, religion, national origin, marital status, veteran status, disability, sexual orientation or any other legally protected status, and to maintain an environment free from discrimination or harassment based upon these grounds.

The CRRA is committed to providing equal opportunities in terms of its recruiting and hiring practices, including without limitation, by notifying its recruitment sources of the CRRA's nondiscrimination policies and by placing "help-wanted" advertisements containing the phrase "An Equal Opportunity Employer." The CRRA is also committed to providing equal opportunities to its employees in all of its employment practices, including but not limited to compensation, training, transfers, promotions and disciplinary procedures, and in the provision of all of its employee benefit programs. Personnel decisions will be made on the basis of the needs of the CRRA and an individual's job-related skills, ability and merit.

The CRRA further pledges its strong commitment to ensure that all contractors and subcontractors who do business with the CRRA provide equal opportunities in employment to all qualified persons solely on the basis of job-related skills, ability and merit. The participation of minority business enterprises meeting qualifications established by applicable regulations shall further be solicited and encouraged.

The CRRA shall include an equal opportunity clause in all of its contracts and shall not enter into any contract with any person, agency or organization if it has knowledge that such person, agency or organization engages in unlawful discriminatory practices.

The CRRA further pledges that all CRRA-sponsored training and social and recreational programs will be administered without regard to any legally protected status.

As part of its commitment to equal opportunities, the CRRA expects all of its employees to adhere to this policy of nondiscrimination. The CRRA will take prompt action upon the receipt of a complaint of unlawful discrimination and will take appropriate corrective action, including disciplinary measures if necessary, to remedy any discriminatory conduct. Complaints should be referred to the Human Resources Manager, who is the CRRA's designated Equal Employment Opportunity (EEO) Officer. Alternatively, employees may submit complaints to the President of the CRRA or to any manager or supervisor.

The day-to-day responsibility for administering and complying with this policy is delegated to the various department heads with respect to the employees within their respective departments. The President and the Board of Directors will provide necessary procedural guidance in the coordination and application of the policy and any changes or modifications to the policy as may be required.

The CRRA's plan for implementing its equal employment and affirmative action policy could include any or all of the following actions:

- 1. Attempt to hire and promote qualified female and minority candidates through efforts to increase the number of highly qualified female and minority applicants for each vacancy, with the ultimate goal that CRRA's workforce will mirror the diversity of the labor pool.
- 2. Attempt to reach a greater number and diversity of representative groups to notify them of employment opportunities with CRRA. - 1. Conduct outreach meetings via telephone with minority organizations during the year to maintain and improve the lines of communication between CRRA and these organizations as well as increase the awareness of CRRA's affirmative action efforts throughout the state's minority communities.

8. EFFORTS TO MITIGATE THE EFFECTS OF AUTHORITY-ENRON-CL&P TRANSACTION DURING FISCAL YEAR 2008

The Authority has corrected all negative impacts of (and considers itself financially solvent from) the effects of the 2001 Authority-Enron-Connecticut Light & Power Company transaction. Highlighted below are selected activities that occurred at the Mid-Connecticut Project during fiscal year 2008.

Full Repayment of State Loan:

On October 26, 2006, the Authority's Board of Directors authorized a resolution to apply the funds escrowed for monthly State Loan payments to be applied toward the full repayment of the State Loan. Due to other pending litigation at the time, this action was delayed until February 2008, when the Authority instructed U.S. Bank to wire \$11,590,518.09 to the State Treasurer for the full repayment of outstanding State Loan principal and interest due. In total, since 2003, the Authority borrowed \$21,500,175 from the State in loans that were, in accordance with State statute, only able to be applied toward the repayment of outstanding Mid-Connecticut Project bonded debt.

Increased Energy Revenues:

On June 20, 2007, the Authority executed an agreement with Constellation Energy Commodities Group for the purchase of the first 250,000 MWh (previously sold to Enron) of electricity generated by the Mid-Connecticut Project for a term of July 1, 2007 through June 30, 2012. The Authority received very favorable pricing that significantly increases electric sales revenues to the Mid-Conn Project. During the five year term of this agreement, the Mid-Conn Project will receive (on a levelized/blended rate basis) approximately \$93.7 million in revenue which represents a net increase in revenue over the five year term of the agreement of \$51 million over the old Enron contract rate.

Administrative Cost Reductions:

The Authority marketed its all risk property insurance program during fiscal year 2008 and was successful in lowering the overall premium by 13.23% even though the reported value of assets increased since by \$11 million over last year.

The Authority is required by the Connecticut General Statutes (Section 1-125) to protect and indemnify all of its directors, officers and employees from liability for the work they do for the Authority. To assist in meeting this obligation, the Authority purchases Public Officials and Employers Liability insurance. During this same time period, the Authority was able to secure the insurance with the same limit of coverage as last year but with lower premium.

The Authority had a somewhat better experience than last year during the renewal of its casualty insurance program (Commercial General Liability, Umbrella/Excess Liability, Pollution Legal Liability, Commercial Automobile Liability and Workers Compensation insurances policies) when a new market expressed interest in providing some of the insurance. This insurance program has a term from October 1, 2007 through October 1, 2008. Historically, the marketplace

is very limited for organizations that are involved in ownership and/or operation of landfills, waste facilities, electric and power operations and treatment facilities, and there is an even smaller market for entities such as the Authority that have sustained significant losses. The Authority was successful in renewing all of these policies, with an 18% reduction in overall premium, and in some cases enhanced coverage.

Outreach to Mid-Connecticut Project member municipalities:

The Authority continues its ongoing program of outreach to member cities and towns and its initiative to increase communications with its host communities. In particular:

- Authority officials met individually with officials from Hartford, Wethersfield, Watertown, Woodbury, Roxbury, Old Saybrook, Old Lyme, Windsor Locks, South Windsor, Suffield and Hebron, and also spoke to meetings of the Northwest Connecticut Council of Governments (including the Mid-Connecticut Project municipalities of Salisbury, North Canaan, Canaan, Cornwall, Sharon, Washington and Roxbury); the Litchfield Hills Council of Elected Officials (including the Mid-Connecticut Project municipalities of Norfolk, Colebrook, Hartland, Goshen, Winchester, Barkhamsted, New Hartford, Torrington, Harwinton, Litchfield and Morris); the Litchfield Hills Recycling Committee (comprised of representatives of the Litchfield Hills Council of Elected Officials and the Northwest Connecticut Council of Governments); the Capitol Region Council of Governments (including the Mid-Connecticut Project municipalities of Hartford, East Hartford, West Hartford, Wethersfield, Rocky Hill, Newington, Farmington, Avon, Simsbury, Granby, East Granby, Enfield, Suffield, Windsor Locks, East Windsor, South Windsor, Bloomfield, Manchester, Vernon, Glastonbury, Canton and Ellington); the Council of Governments of the Central Naugatuck Valley (including the Mid-Connecticut Project municipalities of Beacon Falls, Bethlehem, Middlebury, Naugatuck, Southbury, Thomaston, Waterbury, Watertown and Woodbury); the Lower Connecticut Valley Selectmen's Association (including Mid-Connecticut Project towns of Killingworth, Chester, Lyme, Old Lyme, Old Saybrook, Essex, Deep River, Westbrook and Clinton); and participated in meetings of the South Meadows Problem Solving Committee (a Hartford business organization); the Tri-Bury Rotary (a civic group comprised of members from Southbury, Woodbury and Middlebury); the MetroHartford Chamber of Commerce; the Hartford Neighborhood Environmental Partnership (a Hartford environmental group); the Connecticut Council of Small Towns; and the Connecticut Recyclers Coalition.
- On August 2, 2007, Authority management and Phillup D. BagTM, CRRA's recycling mascot, appeared on the "Community Council" local-access television show hosted by Hartford Councilperson Elizabeth Horton Sheff.
- On August 10, 2007, Authority staff and Phillup D. Bag participated in "Start Them Reading," a book distribution event held at Hartford City Hall by Councilperson Horton Sheff.
- On September 5, 2007, Authority staff and Phillup D. Bag participated in a recycling promotion event at Colebrook Consolidated School.

- On September 26, 2007, Authority management participated in a municipal recycling conference sponsored by the New England Recycling Coalition in the Mid-Connecticut Project municipality of Salisbury.
- On October 24, 2007, Authority management manned an exhibit at the Connecticut Conference of Municipalities annual convention.
- On November 7, 2007, the Authority hosted the annual meeting of the Connecticut Recyclers Coalition.
- On November 13, 14 and 16, the Authority hosted special meetings of Mid-Connecticut Project municipal chief executives.
- On January 15, 2008, Authority management spoke to the East Hartford Town Council.
- On January 17 and February 8, 2008, Authority management met with chief executives of Metropolitan District cities and towns.
- On January 20, 2008, Authority management and staff manned an exhibit at the Connecticut Council of Small Towns annual convention.
- On February 13, 2008, Authority management and staff manned an exhibit at the Legislative Office Building.
- On February 27, 2008, the Authority held its annual meeting for representative of member cities and towns.
- On April 22, 2008, Authority management and staff manned an informational exhibit at the J.C. Penney distribution center in the Mid-Connecticut Project town of Manchester.
