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CRRA Announces Fall Electronics Recycling Collections

Popular Program has Collected 1 Million Pounds of Electronics in Four-Year Span



HARTFORD, Conn. – Electronics continue to become more powerful and less expensive, so more and more people are replacing their computers, VCRs, cellular telephones, printers, answering machines and other electronic gear. But what to do with the old units? The Connecticut Resources Recovery Authority (CRRA) will provide the answer with another series of its popular consumer electronics recycling collections this fall.

"Hundreds of Connecticut residents have turned to CRRA to provide safe, free disposal of their residential electronics under this

program," said CRRA Recycling Division Head Thomas Gaffey. "Since we began these recycling programs in 1999, we have kept more than 1 million pounds of electronics from being buried in landfills."

The pileup of used electronics is becoming a nationwide concern:

- Americans discard 12 million to 14 million computer systems each year, and by 2005 that number may increase to 45 million annually, according to a recent study by the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources.
- Americans will scrap about 400 million units of consumer electronics each year in this decade, according to the International Association of Electronics Recyclers.
- Over 315 million computers will become obsolete by 2004, according to the National Safety Council.

"By far, this has been CRRA's most popular program," Gaffey said. "We have had more requests about this topic than any other on our Web page. Connecticut's residents are extremely environmentally aware, and almost instinctively have held onto their old computers, televisions, and other electronic equipment, not wanting to throw them in the trash."

The electronics recycling collections will be held in CRRA's Wallingford, Bridgeport and Mid-Connecticut Project communities:

- <u>Saturday, Sept. 27, in Norwalk</u>, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Norwalk Public Works Highway Garage, 15 South Smith St.
- Saturday, Oct. 4, in Essex, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the CRRA transfer station near Exit 4 off Route 9.
- <u>Saturday, Oct. 11, in Torrington</u>, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Torrington Water Pollution Control Plant, Bogue Road.
- <u>Saturday, Oct. 25, in Wallingford</u>, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Star parking lot, 984 North Colony Road, Route 5.

These electronics recycling collections are open to residents of CRRA-member towns. Those interested in participating should call their local Public Works Departments to see whether their towns are eligible.
