Looking for something to do during school vacation? The Connecticut Resources Recovery Authority has just the answer. It's expanding the hours of the [Garbage Museum](#) in Stratford and the [Trash Museum](#) in Hartford for the upcoming school vacation, offering more people the chance to have fun while learning how to take better care of our world.



Both museums will be open 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Thursday, Dec. 23, and 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Tuesday, Dec. 28, Wednesday, Dec. 29, and Thursday, Dec. 30. The museums will be closed on Friday, Dec. 31.



Visitors to the Garbage Museum have an opportunity to meet Trash-o-saurus, a one-ton dinosaur made from trash, watch movies and create a recycled craft at Creation Station. Guests may also watch the recycling processing center in action. Admission is \$2 per person, free for children age 3 and under.

At the Trash Museum, visitors can watch CRRA's state-of-the-art single-stream recycling facility in operation, then see the amount of trash one person made in an entire year at [Sustainable Dave's](#) exhibit, [environmentally-themed art](#) and learn how things they do every day can save energy and help the environment. Admission to the Trash Museum is free.
