Specifics	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Planning, design, construction of facilities needed to implement state Solid Waste Management Plan• Plans, surveys, studies necessary to carry out authority functions with respect to acquisition and development of real property• Short- and long-range plans for managing state's solid waste and recovered resources per SWMP• Assist in development of industries and businesses for solid-waste management and materials recovery and recycling

Implement SWMP

Specifics	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Planning, design, financing, construction of facilities needed to implement state Solid Waste Management Plan• CRRA “shall be granted all powers necessary to fulfill these purposes” in accordance with the state Solid Waste Management Plan• Revise and update as may be necessary “that portion of the [SWMP] defined as the ‘solid waste management system’”• CRRA “shall have power to . . . do all things necessary . . . in accordance with the” SWMP

<p>Funding</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • CGS §22a-262 (a) (1): CRRA must generate “revenues sufficient to provide for the support of the authority and its operations on a self-sustaining basis” • CGS §22a-269 (a): CRRA may issue bonds or notes “Subject to the approval of the Treasurer of the state, and any other limitations of” CGS Chapter 446e • Note: CRRA funds its education programs through its operating revenues as well as through grants, contributions and user fees.
